Afterwards the team planted some hazel and hawthorn whips in an open glade at the southern end of Knolls Wood, by which time the weather had changed; it poured with rain and the work was completed in a hurry.

Chiffchaffs in Knolls Wood



As you can tell from the photo, the chiffchaff is a pretty inconspicuous bird (or even a pretty, inconspicuous bird). In fact it's a typical 'little brown job' with a greenish hue, but it does have one definitive feature – the pale stripe above the eye, with a dark line beneath. From our point of view, it begins to make its presence felt in early spring, usually March, when it returns from the Mediterranean area or West Africa. Then it starts singing – 'chiff-chaff-chiff-chaff-chiff-chaff.....', or perhaps 'chiff-chaff-chaff....', or, for a change, 'chiff-chiff-chaff.....'. This can get a trifle wearing. In spite of that, though, it has a real claim to our affections as a harbinger of warmer weather. The song is one of those sounds that can make you think that summer must be on its way.

The demise of a proud Scots Pine.



A fungal infection at the base of an otherwise apparently healthy trunk and crown indicates that it had reached a stage where the tree was no longer safe and must be felled. Once such decay has exceeded one third of the diameter of the core, which can be determined by ultra sound or micro drilling, the strength of the trunk is compromised and strong winds can cause a tree to fall. This tree was bordering the public highway and therefore safety considerations were paramount.

It was felled in sections from the top down. A tree cutter undaunted by the unsafe appearance of the base climbed the tree with a power saw hanging from a belt on his waist and cut sections away until the trunk was reduced to a 20 foot standing section. This was then felled in the classic manner of taking a vee section out of one side and allowing the weight of the remainder of tree to topple it. A tree which will have taken many decades to grow disappears from the landscape in not much more than an hour.

Sadly, increasing numbers of the pines in and around Knolls Wood will be succumbing to old age or disease in the not too distant future. Replacing these trees is difficult as ideally they need to be planted in an open space with plenty of light and as they currently grow in areas populated by other mature species this is not easy.
